1	use different types of lead pencil to show texture using line and tone.	 Different pencils give different tones. Tone is the degree of lightness or darkness. Texture is the feeling, appearance or consistency of an object or material. Artists try to replicate the texture of the subject to make their work look as realistic as possible. 	See lynx files
2	With a variety of pen types, make a variety of lines free-flowing, sweeping, broken, faint & hard.	 A line is a connection between two points. Lines can also be horizontal, vertical, diagonal, straight, curved, thick or thin. Contour lines are the outlines of an object, shape or form. A short, thick, straight line conveys a different feeling or emotion to one that is long, thin and swirly. Line can give an object the appearance of it being 3-dimensional. 	See lynx files
3	To create images in the style of an artist from history and explain how their work is similar/different.	 Henry Moore was a famous artist and sculptor. He was inspired to draw sheep from the Yorkshire countryside near where he lived as a child. Henry Moore used sketches are often made with a ballpoint pen, with swirling lines and zigzags. 4 and 5	To select the brush size and type to create an image with a set coloured background.	 Lauren Terry is an artist that paints cows with a set colour background to make people smile. Focus on facial details, nose eyes and ears. Add texture to show the hairs and the softness of a cow's hide. Add a contrasting background to bring out the cows features. 	See lynx files

6 and 7	To recreate art work in the style of Paul Nash	 Paul Nash was a war artist employed by the government to record the events of the war through drawings and paintings. The government wanted WW1 to be represented through art: to show the experience of war, to remember the fallen and as a means of propaganda. Use landscapes including natural scenery such as forests, mountains, rivers and valleys to show the experience of WW1. 	See lynx files
